Origin. In 1975 an informa 1 meeting in Rome of Anglicans and Roman Catholics recommended in a "Note" to the ABC and Cardinal Willibands of the Secretariat for Christian Unity that a small Consultation of members of the two Churches should take place to consider " to what extent and in what ways churches with women priests and churches without women priests can be reconciled in sacramental fellowship".

Actions agreed. In (date) th a Plenary Session of the Secretariat for Xtn Unity decided a Consultation should be held. In May 1977 the Standing Cte of the ACC, acting under its Terms of Reference No 5, agreed to support Anglican participation in the Consultation and asked the Archbishop of Wanterbury and the Sec Gen of the ACC to nominate Anglican members.

The Terms of Ref rence for the Consultation were To consider to what extent and in what ways churches with women priests and churches without women priests can be reconciled in sacramental fellowship.

Authority. It was agreed the finings and advice of the Consultation would be those of its members.

It was agreed that each Church should have five members. Members. The Roman Catholic members applinted by the Secretariat for Christian Unity were:
